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12 President Angela Echeverri called the meeting to order at 9:31 a.m., and asked those

However, several issues were noted, such as changes made for accessibility would not import into the Canvas shell. Ally could not fix the problems at this time. The Distance Education (DE) Coordinators recommend UDOIT as the accessibility tool to replace Ally. The UDOIT company will give the LACCD a discount if the District contracts for the colleges. Although the colleges will fund locally, the contract will be districtwide. The Vice Presidents have approved, but DAS approval is being sought. The DAS Academic Technology Committee has also recommended approval. The current contract with Ally expired June 30, 2021.
62 63 64 65 66 67	Echeverri will contact Ryan Cornner (Vice Chancellor of Educational Programs and Institutional Effectiveness – EPIE) for a timeline related to purchasing the software in time for implementation for the Fall 2021 Semester. If necessary, and if it is an urgent item, Echeverri could schedule a single-item meeting of the DAS Executive Committee (DAS Exec) for next week.

70 71	LACCD Re-engagement Plan and Return to Campuses
71 72	Echeverri observed much uncertainty regarding the Fall 2021 Semester, especially with

73 the highly contagious Delta variant of the novel coronavirus, and a District re-masking

74 mandate indoors but no requirements for social distancing. Some counseling faculty are 75 concerned about counseling students in restricted spaces with inadequate ventilation 76 and no social distancing. About 25% of classes districtwide are fully in-person for Fall 77 2021. If one includes hybrid classes, the percentage of classes with an in-person 78 component is raised to 30%. Concerns were expressed as to what that return in Fall 79 going to look like, and some Senators observed that students also need to feel safe to 80 return in person. For example, in some cases, enrollment for online classes is high but 81 that for in-person classes is very low. The HI FLEX classrooms at the colleges might not 82 be finished by the beginning of the Fall Semester. More instructors are getting DE 83 certified, but early deadlines for submission of schedules of classes for Winter and 84 Spring 2022 are still in place.

86 Echeverri shared the Fall 2021 enrollment numbers, noting shortfalls of 33% to 40% in 87 headcount compared to 2019. Of concern is that we are losing students 88 disproportionately in some of our most vulnerable communities; we are also losing first-89 time students. Learning loss, especially in English and Mathematics, is of great concern, 90 especially for entering freshmen. The "hold harmless" budgetary period for California 91 Community Colleges (CCCs) has been extended for an additional year, and the CCCs will 92 be receiving a 5% cost of living adjustment (COLA) for this upcoming fiscal year. The 93 State budget also has funding for diversity, equity, and inclusion, an increase in funding 94 for part-time faculty office hours, as well as funding to increase the number of full-time 95 faculty. At present, because all COVID-19 vaccines are being administered under Food 96 and Drug Administration (FDA) emergency use authorizations, the LACCD Board of 97 Trustees will not issue a mandate for students or employees to get vaccinated. This 98 position might change if the FDA gives its full approval to the vaccines. The LACCD 99 Office of General Counsel will develop instructions for faculty if and when students 100 refuse to wear a mask in their classrooms. 101 102 **Planning for:**

110 Echeverri reported that Governor Newsom's Executive Order suspending certain 111 provisions of the Brown Act expires September 30, 2021. She and some of the Senate 112 Presidents expressed concern that persons will be reluctant to come to in-person senate 113 meetings, either at the Educational Services Center (ESC) or at their colleges. Thus, 114 there would be difficulty in getting quorum, both at District and at local senate 115 meetings. Should the Executive Order expire and should there not be legislation to 116 extend the suspension, the Brown Act does permit teleconferencing as long as the 117 locations of all Senators attending remotely are posted. These posted locations could

include central college locations (which would permit social distancing) or facultyoffices.

121 Echeverri stated that she is awaiting written reports from some of the colleges to 122 include in *Academically Speaking* (the DAS newsletter). She encouraged the prompt

submission of articles as she is hopeful to publish the newsletter in the next few weeks.
 She has still not received the dates for the collegiality in action/technical assistance visit,

125 stating that she was hopeful that it could occur in the summer. Echeverri will follow up

- 126 with LACCD Chancellor Francisco Rodriguez.

Referencing the LACCD/DAS Fall Summit, Echeverri requested suggestions for possible
topics. They included: credit for prior learning; the eLumen rollout; culturally
responsive curriculum; re-engagement at the colleges; what "back to normal" looks like
at the college and global levels; Guided Pathways initiatives; meta-majors; changes in

132 the student body, e.g., students attending a community college instead of a university

133 or deciding not to return to college or to work; student focus groups (interviewed in

advance of the Summit) with follow-up at the Summit; loss of first-year students; and

135 COVID-19-related learning loss. Echeverri noted that Pierce will pilot a special
 136 Mathematics program in Fall 2021 to offer courses to help students who are not reading

137 to take transfer-level courses in Math. Possible topics for the Fall Summit will also be 138 discussed at consultation.

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Update on Ethnic Studies General Education Requirement and Faculty Hiring

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Atondo reported that there is nothing new on CSUGE (California State University
General Education) Area F courses. Very few CCC courses have been approved
statewide to meet this new Area F requirement. The CCC Board of Governors will
institute an Ethnic Studies requirement for an Associate's degree; there are no
implementation guidelines at present. The related LACCD Administrative Procedure will
need to be updated.

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149 Echeverri reported that AB 1040, which was intended to provide funding for the hiring 150 Ethnic Studies faculty, died in committee. With recent changes to Title 5 related to 151 Ethnic Studies, it is surmised that there is a reluctance on the part of the California 152 Legislature to have an additional bill on a similar topic. There were calls for the 153 expansion of the groups identified in Ethnic Studies to increase inclusivity. Currently, 154 there are four areas: African American, Asian American, Latinx, and Native American. 155 Echeverri relayed the desire that the District expressed to hire 100 full-time faculty in 156 Ethnic Studies. Currently, in the LACCD, there are 24 full-time faculty in Chicano/Latinx 157 Studies, 2 in African-American Studies, 2 in Asian-American Studies, and none in Native 158 American Studies. There were questions and concerns about how this initiative would 159 fit into the faculty hiring prioritization processes at the colleges.

161 J. Hernandez observed that the intent of AB 1040 was not related to designating money

162 for the hiring of full-time faculty, but, rather, to backfill state-mandated costs. On the

- 163 subject of the CSUGE Area F requirement and the denial of so many requests from the
- 164 CCCs, and from the LACCD in particular, for courses to fulfill that requirement, he
- 165 recommended a motion from the DAS to the California State Universities to put
- pressure on them to explain their denial of those requests. J. Hernandez suggested that
 the courses be resubmitted in June and shared a link to what the Board of Governors
 had approved.

- Senators added that the CSUs are not being transparent, that denials of submitted
 courses are inconsistent, and that those actions will be problematic for our students as
 they try to transfer. Echeverri will include this topic on the DAS Exec Retreat agenda.

175 AB 705 Task Force and Recommendations to Address COVID-19-Related Learning Loss 176

Echeverri referenced the Math Success Academy at Pierce, and noted that it is a
program, not just an offering of courses below transfer level. Pierce will pilot this
program in the Fall. Math 75 is a new course intended to target students who drop

180 Math 134 (accelerated elementary and intermediate algebra) or who have taken 134 or

181 228A (statistics pathway part 1) but who either withdrew or failed the course. Courses

- 182 will begin the third week of the Fall 2021 Semester, and will include tutors and peer 183 mentors. Reports on learning loss, especially among elementary and secondary pupils,
- is contained in BoardDocs. There have also been some lawsuits against some CCC
 districts related to the implementation of AB 705, alleging that those colleges have not
- 186 been adopting the spirit of that legislation adequately.

188 LACCD Participation in California Virtual Campus-Online Education Initiative (CVC-OEI) 189

190 Miller explained that all of the District's online courses are in the exchange (this permits 191 all students to enroll in any online class in the state). Colleges which are listed as 192 participants will be placed higher in the search results for students looking for online 193 CCC classes. The Peer Online Course Review (POCR) is a system at the college developed 194 to help improve courses, especially in an online platform. The presumption is that those 195 courses have met the appropriate rubrics and are considered excellent courses. POCR 196 courses will be higher up on the exchange search results. Should the LACCD participate 197 as a district, students would not have to go through CCC Apply and complete separate 198 admissions applications to take online courses at multiple colleges in multiple districts. 199 There would also be potential financial aid benefits to students.

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It is unknown if the LACCD can join as a district with not all of the colleges participating.
 Maddren reported that there had been robust discussions at Valley, with votes on this

- 203 topic at 2 separate senate meetings. The motion to participate in the Exchange had
- 204 been voted down on both occasions. Maddren agreed to place this item on the agenda

205 at Valley's senate, but also requested data that participation in the Exchange will 206 produce and has produced enrollment increases.

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208 Update on Tutor Classifications

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- 210 J. Hernandez reported on a fruitful meeting with VC Cornner and Interim Vice Chancellor 211 of Human Resources Mercedes Gutierrez on this topic, noting that there might be a 212 possibility to reinstate Tutor classifications III and IV. Although the reclassifications of 213 unclassified employee positions was done in committee fashion, it might have been 214 more helpful to use a desk audit approach. Echeverri will send out a reminder email to 215 follow up.

217 Sustainable Environment Institute & LACCD Sustainability Efforts

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219 Echeverri reported that Chancellor Rodriguez increased the budget for SEI (Sustainable 220 Environment Institute). George Leddy, the Coordinator, has been increased from a .2 to 221 a .4. A .6 is available to hire a faculty member to help faculty develop curriculum across 222 the disciplines to include sustainability. Echeverri asked the Senators to encourage 223 faculty to apply for the .6 position when it becomes available.

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- 225 Update on Administrative Retreat Rights Policy
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227 Echeverri gave a brief report on the background, noting that the LACCD does not have a 228 written administrator retreat rights policy, and that the LACCD and the DAS need to 229 reach mutual agreement on these policies and procedures. There have been many 230 meetings between the DAS task force and the LACCD administration on this topic. 231 Educational administrators with faculty tenure in the District retain tenure (Education 232 Code Section 87454) and may return to a faculty position in the LACCD. At issue is a 233 request from the represented administrators, i.e., deans, for a grandparent clause 234 granting current administrators without faculty tenure in the District the same rights as 235 those who do. Also under discussion are the policies pertaining to unrepresented 236 educational administrators who have a retreat rights clause in their employment 237 contracts.

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239 Resolution on District-Wide Survey on Social Justice, Work Ethics, and Personnel 240 Diversification

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242 Hernandez distributed a resolution made by the East Los Angeles College's Senate's 243 Committee on Academic Freedom and Ethics (CAFÉ). Randall Gust, a faculty member at 244 East, spoke about the resolution as well. Echeverri will notice a motion in August for 245 future action, and requested feedback from the local senates.
