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California Opportunity Youth Apprenticeship Grants (COYA)

LACCD was recently awarded a Pre-Apprenticeship Planning Grant for Automation Technician Programming aimed at Opportunity Youth with Autism Spectrum Disorder and Other Developmental Disabilities. This project is led by Children's Hospital Los Angeles in partnership with the USC Center for Advanced Manufacturing (USC CAM), LACCD Workforce and Economic Development, the Autism Society of Los Angeles (ASLA), Advanced Manufacturing & Transportation Apprenticeships of California (AMTAC), and the non-profit organization Foundation DIAG USA.

Funded through the California Department of Industrial Relations (DIR) and its Division of Apprenticeship Standards (DAS), this grant is part of the California Opportunity Youth Apprenticeship Grants (COYA), which aims to increase pre-apprenticeships and apprenticeships that help youth enter and advance in high-quality careers.

The COYA grant supports a pre-apprenticeship program in **Automation Technician Programming** for opportunity youth, ages 16-24, with autism spectrum disorder and other developmental disabilities. This program is a key step toward developing a pipeline to employment for this underemployed population in California.

Project Objectives:

- Equip developmentally disabled youth for careers in automation and robotics.
- Focus on high-demand fields within advanced manufacturing and aerospace.
- Develop a hybrid training model.
- Combine didactic learning with in-person and virtual experiences tailored to meet the needs of individuals with autism spectrum disorder and developmental disabilities.

The 2023-24 State Legislative cycle closed at midnight on August 31. The Governor now has until September 30 to sign or veto legislative measures that reached his desk this year. While we wait to learn the outcome of our sponsored and supported bills, we thank the Advocacy Team for your unwavering support and active involvement in making this another highly successful legislative year. Regardless of the bills' outcome, your dedication and hard work have led to increased awareness of these critical issues that will benefit our communities and create opportunities.

LACCD Honored with Prestigious Award For Its Cutting-Edge Digital Maintenance System

LACCD was awarded the prestigious Ellington Innovation Award in recognition of its leadership in advancing technological integration and fostering innovation in higher education. Joining top four-year higher education institutions, LACCD is demonstrating how to effectively integrate data from BIM, GIS, CMMS, and mobile technology with state-owned facility inventory, facility condition and the capital planning system.

LACCD's Facilities & Planning Department (FPD) and BuildLACCD also presented their work on developing CMMS at the 2024 Campus Facilities Management and Technology Association Annual Conference in Pasadena, California. CFTA is a national organization focused on the development, integration, and application of technology across multiple disciplines in the planning, construction, maintenance, and management of campus facilities.








BuildLACCD's Largest Intern Cohort Participates in Career Development Program

In August, BuildLACCD hosted a luncheon with the summer interns at Los Angeles Trade-Technical College. Over 40 interns attended, along with several Bond Program and District Facilities leadership involved in managing and mentoring these interns.

Fall 2024 Credit Enrollment Update:

Comparing Fall 2024 to Fall 2023 as day 14 of the semester, districtwide, student credit headcount is down by 1% and enrollment is up by 2% while class offerings are down by 2% and enrollment per section is up by 3%. Small declines are observed for most age groups and there is a 6% increase for younger students (under age 20). Increases are observed for most ethnic groups with an 8% increase for Asian students and 2% increase for Hispanic students. A decline in White and Unknown students (-13% for each group) is observed, likely stemming from more stringent identity verification requirements for enrollment in Fall 2024 in comparison to Fall 2023. An 8% increase in full-time students is also observed, with a decline for part-time students. Noncredit headcount and enrollment increased by,

respectively, 12% (12,780 to 14,344) and 18% (23,117 to 27,300). 46% of classes are being taught remotely, 46% are in-person, and 8% are hybrid. Remote classes have the highest fill rate (78%) with hybrid and in-person classes having comparable fill rates (75% and 73%, respectively).

Apprenticeships

West LA College received a U.S. Department of Labor \$12 million dollar scaling apprenticeship grant in 2019. Since then, West has expanded apprenticeship programs throughout Los Angeles and the nation, becoming a partner and leader in the apprenticeship space. Some highlights include:

- 1. Over the last 2 years, over 200 registered apprentices in dental assisting, early childhood education and aircraft mechanics have earned West LA College certificates, obtained state licenses and have received wage increases in their jobs. In fall 2024, we are launching the sixth early childhood educator apprenticeship program cohort and the eighth dental assistant apprenticeship program cohort.
- 2. **West has submitted a new Pharmacy Technician apprenticeship** program to the CA division apprenticeship standards and once approved, will be starting a cohort.
- 3. West has accepted a role on the Space STEM and Workforce Policy National Space Council formed and directed by the Office of the Vice President and Democratic party nominee, Kamala Harris, and we are excited to participate in an upcoming tentative meeting this fall at the White House.





Caring Wildcats

Under the direction of Vicky Nesia, Executive Assistant, West employees participate in activities designed to connect and inform them as well as show appreciation for their hard work. Over the summer, there was a particular focus on Classified Staff. West Wednesday coffee and snack meet-ups were held at different spots around campus and some featured games to promote mixing and mingling and teamwork. An outgrowth of employees who care about each other is a culture of faculty and staff who express care for the students. Particular practices

encouraged through Caring Wildcats are the "10ft Rule" where employees proactively greet students within 10 ft and ask if they need assistance. Another example is striving to have relational connections with students rather than transactional ones.



Music Educators

Guild of Music Supervisors – State of Music in Media Conference was held at West in August. Approximately 600 musicians and music/entertainment executives and professionals were in attendance



over the course of the day. The Keynote speaker was Grammy Award-winning singer-songwriter Lisa Loeb.

\$20 Million EPA Grant

Earlier this summer, the Coalition for Responsible Community Development (CRCD) and LATTC were announced as one of 21 selected applicants of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's Environmental and Climate Justice Community Change Grants.

The \$20 million grant is made possible by President Biden's \$2 billion Inflation Reduction Act Program and is designed to help disadvantaged communities tackle








Welcome Back, Brahmas!

Strengthening STEM Pathways

Los Angeles Mission College's STEM department was recently awarded a two-year \$180,000 grant from the National Science Foundation (NSF) to enhance STEM education.

This funding will be used to integrate state-of-the-art instruments and technologies into the Chemistry, Physics, Engineering, and Computer Science curricula. Additionally, it will help strengthen LAMC's STEM student cohort by engaging local high school students and creating pathways from high school to certificate programs and transfer degrees.

This is the second NSF grant the college has received in three years; in 2021, LAMC was awarded over \$500,000 to expand its Biotechnology pipeline from certification to employment.




A Moment in History

Scotty Hong: From Army Veteran to MIT-Bound Scholar

Scotty Hong's journey from a U.S. Army veteran to an accomplished student at East Los Angeles College (ELAC) is a testament to perseverance and the power of education. Hong, a former Preventive Medicine Specialist who served in the Army for five years from 2017 to 2022, found his way to ELAC after watching the Netflix docuseries Last Chance U: Basketball. Hong's decision to join the military stemmed from a chance encounter with an Army recruitment van. This spontaneous choice led to five years of service, during which he gained valuable life experiences, traveled the world and developed leadership skills. The idea of pursuing higher education struck Hong during a challenging land navigation exercise. Inspired by successful veterans who excelled in college, he decided to embark on his own academic journey. Initially apprehensive about mathematics, Hong began his studies

at ELAC as a Business and Economics major. However, a transformative experience in a Philosophy class and summer research prompted him to confront his fears and switch to a Mathematics major. During his time at ELAC, Hong demonstrated exceptional academic prowess:

- Completed the Honors Program in just one year
