Harvard Publication Features Article by Professor Agredano

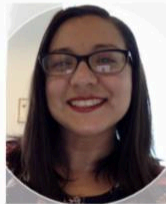
"Behind the Veil: Religion, Fashion and Latinas," by Felipe Agredano, WLAC Professor of Ethnic Studies, appeared in the November edition of ReVista, Harvard Review of Latin America. The article, published in both English and Spanish, spans 100 years of Latina/Chicana fashion and religion.

From Victorian-era hats to contemporary veils, the transnational historical evolution of women's head coverings both reflects fashion and creates it. "Religious head covering is not thought of as fashion, but it is and has been for centuries," a friend of mine recently observed. I want to take a look at how this fashion— particularly veils—has evolved into a multi-million-dollar industry, including design, production, distribution, marketing and international trade.

Agredano earned his Associate of Arts at East LA College, dual Bachelor's degrees from UC Berkeley in Government and Chicano Studies, a Master's from Harvard University, and Fellowships in comparative religion at Oxford, Universidad Menendez Pelayo in Santander, Spain, and Christianity in Italy.

4 Out Of 21 TGQF Fellows Selected from WLAC

West LA College Professors **Elena Avilés**, **Katherine LaTourrette** (formerly Boutry), **Sandra Ruiz** and **Stella Setka** have been jointly awarded The Great Questions Foundation Faculty Fellowship. This prestigious and highly competitive fellowship, funded by the Mellon Foundation, places 21 community college faculty members from across the country into a two-year faculty leadership incubator focused on fostering discussion-based and student-centered pedagogy within the liberal arts.

In addition to redesigning their courses, the fellows will host at least one humanities-focused event in Spring 2025 open to West students and faculty creating a platform for meaningful dialogue that reflects the values of a liberal arts education. The West faculty have centered their project around the key "Great Question:": What is 'a good life'? This question will guide their course redesigns which include incorporating shared texts. LaTourrette will be redesigning English 101 courses, while Ruiz and Avilés will redesign Chicano Studies 047 and Spanish 003, respectively.

"We are thrilled to align this work with the mission of West Los Angeles College, particularly in fostering a learning-centered environment that encourages critical thinking and student engagement. As TGQF Faculty Fellows, we look forward to contributing to the college's efforts to empower students to thrive academically and professionally by encouraging a culture of intellectual curiosity, critical dialogue, and reflective learning," said Setka.

On Saturday, October 19, 117 singers from LAVC and vocal music students from nine surrounding high schools gathered to share a day of music-making at the LAVC Vocal Arts Day celebration. The event was hosted by LAVC Vocal Arts, singers from LAVC, and Glenn Carlos, LAVC director of choral activities. The high school and college students enjoyed a day-long workshop of singing, conducting, drumming, vocal technique, positive self-affirming exercise and building new friendships across the high school and college spectrum.

Guest artist clinicians included a powerhouse of musical clinicians. USC's Venezuelan percussion professor and studio musician, Aaron Serfaty led students in hand Latin-groove percussion workshops using over 50 percussion instruments. LAVC Vocal Arts faculty, Dr. Christian Nova, head of LAVC's vocal faculty who also performed in the title role in Phantom of the Opera on the show's first tour, and Dr. Erinn Horton, jazz and pop recording artist, from helped students to explore technique in every vocal style for the healthiest singing. Professor Glenn Carlos, who is a consultant for the Grammy Awards Museum and Foundation, guided students through complex-rhythms conducting lessons with 117 conductor's batons and a self-affirming exercise for young artists.

The day concluded with all the high school and college singers learning and singing the spell binding Adiemus by Welsh composer Karl Jenkins, conducted by Carlos and accompanied by the brilliant LAVC staff accompanist, Natalie Pang.

Reigning Conference Player of The Year Jocelyn Coronado Dubbed All-American

Freshman [Jocelyn Coronado](#), the reigning Western State North Conference Player of the Year, was selected as an All-American. Coronado earns another honor after a wonderful season in which the Brahmas reached the second round of the regional playoffs. She is one of 22 players selected for this honor; Out of 22, only six are forwards. It is the fourth All-American honor in Women's Soccer program history. The freshman accumulated a total of 28 pts, 11 goals, and six assists. Coronado will be recognized at an award ceremony on January 11th in Chicago, Illinois.



Men's Basketball Wins Third Straight Game

In a thrilling stretch of games, the Los Angeles Pierce College Men's Basketball team secured their third consecutive victory with a dominant 72-58 win over Los Angeles Trade Tech College. From start to finish, the team displayed impressive offensive execution. Leading by double digits for most of the game, the Brahmas led by as much as 17 points. The Brahmas made nearly half of their buckets in the paint. Pierce recorded 34 points in the paint, in comparison to LATTC who finished with 22. Pierce was able to get some good open looks, shooting 47% from the field, and 31% from beyond the arc. Freshman [Markus Steele](#) led all scorers with 25 points and just finished shy of a double-double with nine rebounds. Sophomore [Jule Sims](#) had eight assists and 10 rebounds. Sophomore [Tyler Glisson](#) added 14 points off the bench.



Pierce College and UCLA IEEE Bring Students a Hands-on Workshop Series

In its second year, Pierce College's MESA (Math, Engineering, Science Achievement) partnered with the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE) student branch at UCLA for a three-part series of workshops designed specifically to provide community college students with hands-on experience with technical skills to boost success in future internships careers and engineering courses. Twenty-one dedicated Mesa students participated in the workshop series on three consecutive Saturdays at Pierce in the fall semester of 2024. They worked on projects, incorporating, electrical, circuits, soldering, Arduino's, and digital signals.

The workshop was made possible by the engineering students from IEEE at UCLA who volunteered their time; funding from Pierce College CTE; the dedication and effort from Lilach Farhy in Electronics; and the use of the Electronics facilities. Pierce MESA plans to repeat the workshop series in spring 2025 with peer students from the first cohort serving as leads and mentors, and UCLA IEEE students in a supporting role. Additionally, Pierce is working with other partners on expanding topics for hands-on workshops to build student capacity and confidence.

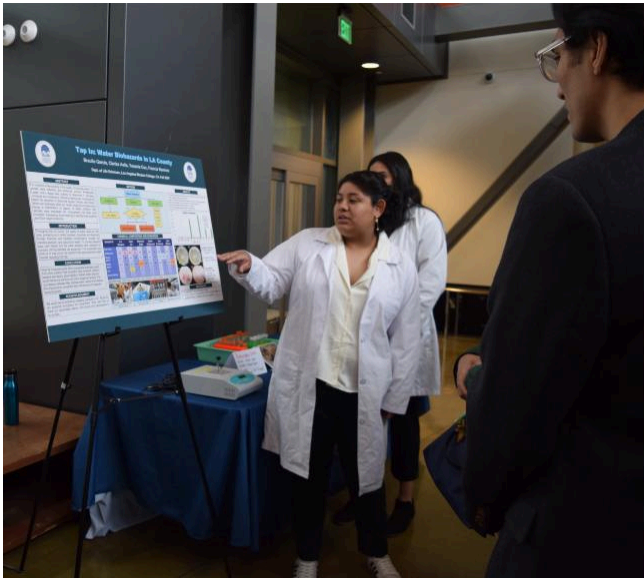




Pacoima Parade

In December, under the leadership of **Trustee Gabriel Buelna** and **Trustee Nichelle Henderson**, LACCD reconvened the Student Rights Protection Task Force meeting (formerly known as the DACA Task Force). This Rapid Response Task Force is designed to keep LACCD students, staff, and faculty, empowered and informed, with your active participation and support we will provide information and resources for at-risk student populations. To further support these efforts, the Office of Legislative & Governmental Relations is working with various local, state, and federal representatives, community-based organizations, and the California Community College Chancellor's Office to protect the rights of all students, including undocumented individuals. A "Know Your Rights" campaign will be unveiled soon. The Task Force plans to meet regularly to share guidance and support.

On Thursday, March 27th, LACCD, the State Chancellor's Office, and the Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities (HACU) will co-host a Statewide In-Language Education Summit at Los Angeles Trade-Technical College. The Summit, presided over by **Trustee Gabriel Buelna** and **President Kelsey Iino**, will be built off of AB 1096 (Fong), an LACCD-sponsored measure that passed in 2023, which established the right for community colleges to teach courses in languages other than English without requiring students to enroll in an ESL concurrently. 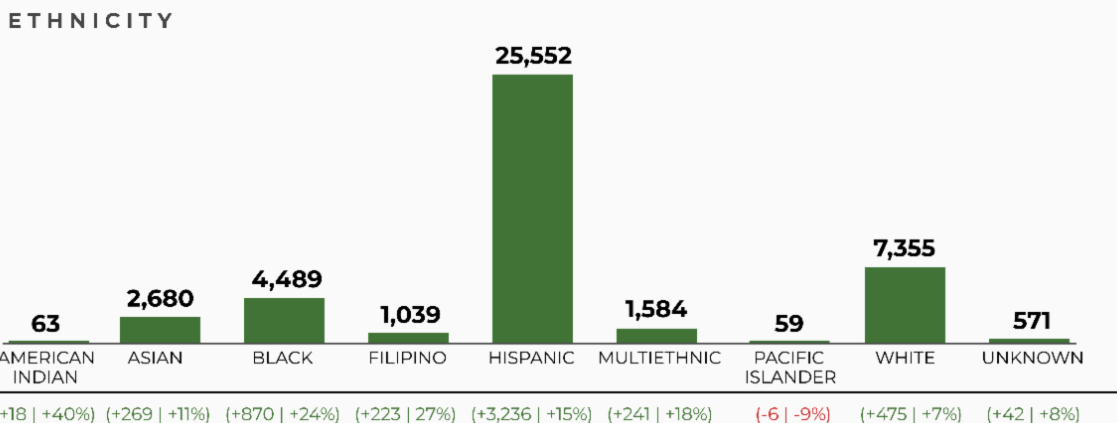

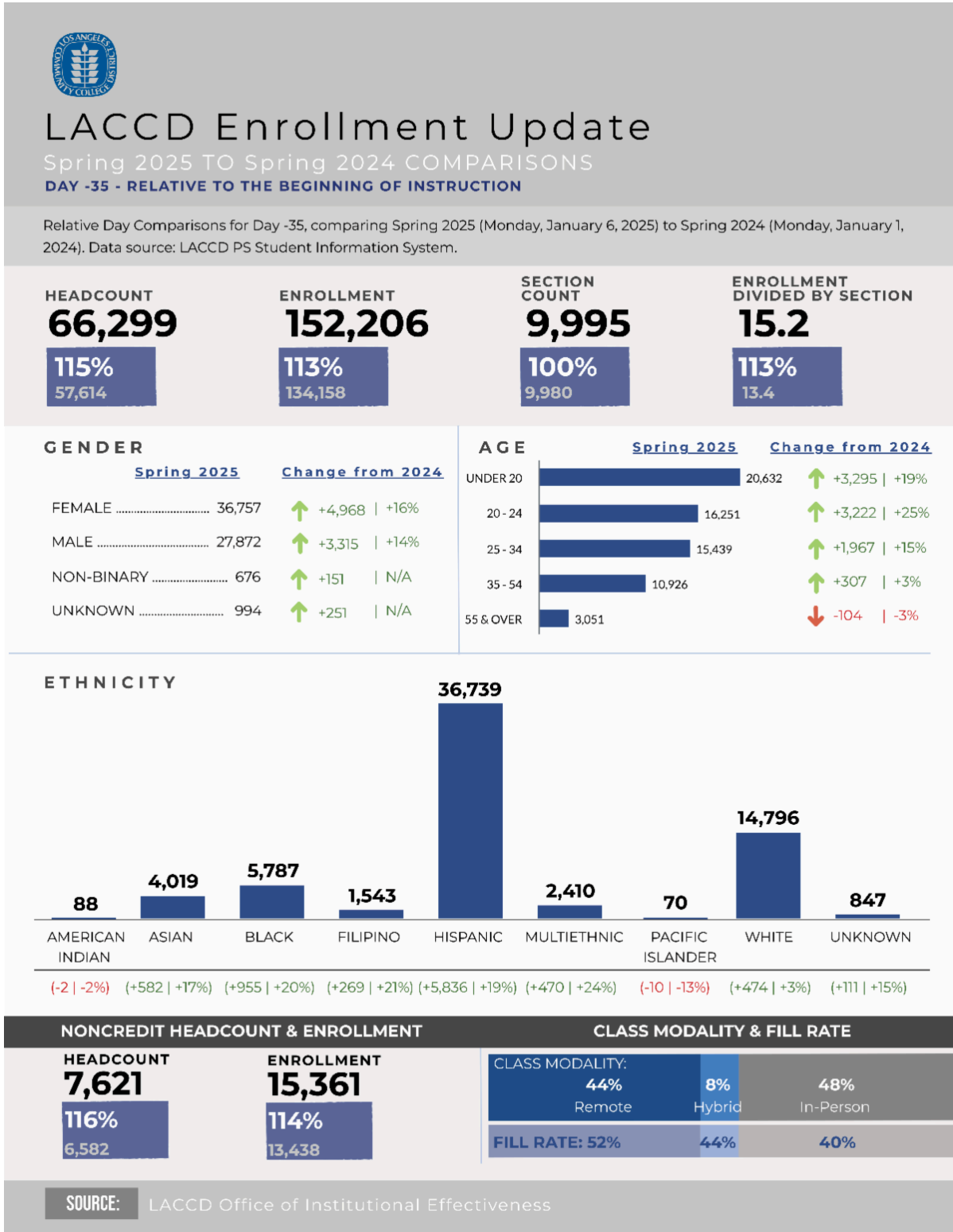

Winter 2025 Enrollment Update:

Comparing Winter 2025 to Winter 2024 as of the first day of instruction, districtwide, student credit headcount is up by 14% and enrollment is 17% higher while class offerings are up by 6% and enrollment per section is up by 10%. Increases are observed for all, except the oldest, student age group (+16% increase for the under age 20 group, +17% for the 20-24 age group, +12% for the 25-34 age group, and +10% for the 35-54 age group, 0% for the 55+ age group). Additionally, increases are observed for nearly all ethnic groups: Asian students (+11%), Hispanic students (+15%), Black students (+24%), and White students (+7%). Noncredit headcount and enrollment increased by, respectively, +29% and +32% (5,159 to 6,638 for headcount and 6,296 to 8,306 for enrollment). 73% of classes are being taught remotely, 21% are in-person, and 6% are hybrid. Remote classes have the highest fill rate (95%) followed by hybrid (82%) and in-person classes (77%).



Spring 2025 Enrollment Update:

Comparing Spring 2025 to Spring 2024 as 35 days before the first day of instruction, districtwide, student credit headcount is up by 15% and enrollment is 13% higher while class offerings are unchanged, and enrollment per section is up by 13%. Increases are observed for all, except the oldest, student age group (+19% for the under age 20 group, +25% for the 20-24 age group, +15% for the 25-34 age group, +3% for the 35-54 age group, and -3% for the 55+ age group. Additionally, increases are

observed for nearly all ethnic groups: Asian students (+17%), Hispanic students (+19%), Black students (+20%), and White students (+3%). Noncredit headcount increased by +16% (from 6,592 to 7,621) and enrollment increased by +14% (from 13,438 to 15,361). 44% of classes are being taught remotely, 48% are in-person, and 8% are hybrid. Remote classes have the highest fill rate (52%) followed by hybrid (44%) and in-person classes (40%).
